



EDITORIAL

They've made us very cross. Elmswell is angry. Here's why.

'They' have, in recent years, piled on the development. We now have the largest population in Mid Suffolk, barring Stowmarket.

Nevertheless, we still have to travel to the next village to see the doctor. Now they tell us that this arrangement will suit our children's schooling, too. Our five year olds will be queuing for the school bus to Woolpit or beyond.

Meanwhile, at School Road, fronting Pightle Close, on the last feasible site for a properly-sized and situated second Elmswell primary school, Mid Suffolk District Council's Cabinet has decided that, not only is this arrangement for Elmswell's children appropriate, but that they will make it worse by dumping yet another 50 houses in our midst.

To make a bitter pill even harder to swallow, they deigned to 'consult'. Not on whether we want another 50 houses. Not on whether our negotiations with the education authority and their own planning officers were making progress towards a better educational future for our kids. No. They were asking whether we liked the design of the houses that were, like it or not, coming our way. As if, in thinking about moving home, it is best to start with the colour of the new curtains.

Of course, our brighter reader will be pointing out that this is, 'double jeopardy'. In one move we lose our school site and yet gain the extra pupils moving into our 50 new homes. To join the early-morning queue for the school bus. Perhaps this is why there was, effectively, no notice given of the consultation session. We have checked...the room was booked at Wesley many weeks ago by a third party who could not say what it was for. We have checked further - the Parish Council was notified by an email arriving after 6.00pm on Wednesday for the session scheduled for the following Thursday. 7 days' notice. There were no posters. Clearly no time for an advertisement in the Newsletter. Nothing, our younger reader confirms, on Social Media.

In the spirit of a 'consultation', our Parish Council chairman suggested that more folk might like to be aware. Otherwise, without a little publicity, the scheme might be denied the full community scrutiny which, surely, lay at the heart of the consultation enterprise?

Word began to trickle out, which is when we got cross. Which is when the Press were contacted and petitions started. Which is why, on the day of the, 'engagement event', Wesley was full of confused and angry villagers being asked to comment on house-types and road layouts when the real question, 'why are you removing our last chance of education for our kids in their own village', left the consultants confused. No-one had told

them that this would be the first the village had heard of their lovely scheme. There was a sprinkling of officers present, equally bemused as to why we didn't want to assess the eco-credentials of yet another new housing estate. Of the Cabinet Members who had cooked up the idea in splendid isolation, there were none.

It was a little bloody – but it had an effect. The decision to press on with the scheme, already many thousands of pounds in the development, has been 'called-in' for scrutiny. It was accepted that the elite Councillors who had been promoting the scheme were not in possession of all of the relevant facts. They had not mentioned anything to their Planning officers who had, since January of this year, been meeting with the County Council Education Planners, Ward Members and the Parish Council to seek ways to avoid the unacceptable imposition of out-of-village education for Elmswell's children.

The Parish Council has asked to be allowed to address the Scrutiny Committee hearing which will review the matter. Parish Councillors will, as ever, remain in touch with their constituents. Watch this space.

Reason to be grateful, we suggest, for the voluntary efforts of Councillors and so many others, who have shaped our village in recent years. From those in the 1950's who hand-built the Memorial Hall and, less successfully, marched to save the village playing field where Oxer Close now stands. Who retained the library on the old hall site whilst kick-starting Blackbourne which has never stopped growing and adapting to accommodate our growing population. Who put together the Wesley land purchase bid and were responsible for the runaway success of the community hub which now touches so many lives. And who sought our permission to press on and purchase the Tavern site next door to take further an aspiration for genuine community-led local housing and the Elmswell Tavern as our community pub.

This latest scheme offers a new opportunity for all of us to play a part and to be involved. We have been asked to include with this edition a reminder of the chance to help shape the refurbishment of our pub into a customer-driven, family-friendly local serving our ever-expanding community with a bottom line which, as with Blackbourne and Wesley, seeks to show more than just financial profit. There is a community premium which the shareholders will, for ever, drive and shape to suit our village.

There can't have been a worse time in recent years to launch a share issue. We are where we are, and those driving this initiative clearly suggest that, despite the current circumstances, we can have some control over where our village is headed.

We have temporarily applied a brake to the damaging School Road threat to our children' education.

More positively, We can help encourage the proposal put forward by the aptly named, 'Elmswell Community Enterprise', and continue the drive for a better Elmswell buy taking a stake in the Elmswell Tavern refurbishment.

ELMSWELL ART CLUB

English portrait and landscape painter, Thomas Gainsborough, was born in Sudbury, Suffolk and he is considered one of the most important British artists of the second half of the 18th century. Although he was a prolific portrait painter, Gainsborough gained greater satisfaction from his landscapes including Cornard Wood, near Sudbury, Suffolk (1748); Landscape in Suffolk (1748) and Holywells Park, Ipswich (1750).

His childhood home is situated in the centre of Sudbury and has been undergoing significant redevelopment since 2019 and will be open to the public from the end of Autumn 2022.


The Gainsborough House website says that "...Reviving the artist's birthplace seeks to attract visitors not only from East Anglia and London, but across England and abroad. Nowhere else in the world will such a wide collection of Gainsborough's art and works by those he inspired, be seen in a single setting. It will provide spaces for exhibitions, displays and learning with four new galleries – a showcase Gainsborough gallery, a landscape studio with panoramic views over Sudbury, a community gallery and a temporary exhibition gallery/performance space."



ELMSWELL WI

After we had sung Jerusalem, Brenda welcomed Edwina Hughes, who spoke to us about dyeing and printing with plants. She had displayed an interesting array of plants as well as dyed and printed fabrics and information.

Whilst studying for a master's degree in Norwich, she became increasingly aware of the negative impact of chemical dyes and their effect on the climate. eq. Residue from dye factories is poured into rivers, polluting the water and killing wildlife. Many famous labels use these factories. Some members of the fashion industry have become more aware of these problems. eg Vivien Westwood, and there is now more emphasis on sustainablility.

A girls woollen outfit, which dates from the Bronze Age, was found in 2015, and chemical analysis showed that it had been dyed using bark, nettles and other plants. Natural fabrics should always be used and should be thoroughly washed, before dyeing with plants. The colours obtained vary according to the fabric; the acidity/alkalinity of the water used; the time taken; the container, eg aluminium, iron, or copper, and whether heat is used. Plants are treated in various ways, when prepared for dyeing. Woad, Weld and Indigo have been used for thousands of years. Sometimes the whole plant is used or just the roots or leaves. Edwina brought some plants for us to use in different ways, Some people wrapped

used a copper pipe or tried some printing, using leaves.

Very interesting results were achieved after about an hour. Edwina showed us different fabrics and the various effects created. They were beautiful. These fabrics may be used to make clothes, patchwork quilts, bags, or for covering

We all had a fascinating evening and it was fun to try out some of the dyeing and printing methods ourselves.

We are now looking forward to our Christmas social evening! How quickly this year is passing.....





ELMSWELL HISTORY GROUP

Our November speaker, Dr Nick Amor, took us back to medieval times with his talk on how "Law & Order" was applied to keep the peace in Suffolk. The 14th Century was a period of turmoil and strife in Suffolk, as it was in much of England. Antipathy towards the abbey caused serious riots to break out in Bury St Edmunds in 1327. Furthermore, famines blighted the opening decades of the century and, in1349, The Great Plague struck, from which roughly half the population of this county had died within a few years. A general uneasiness of the population followed and also a weakening of the prevailing feudal structures, particularly serfdom. Consequently, in 1381, clumsily introduced taxes ignited the general uprising across East Anglia and some southern counties – subsequently known as The Peasants' Revolt. It was particularly bloody in Suffolk where John Cambridge, the Prior of the powerful abbey in Bury St Edmunds, was summarily executed by a mob as he fled across The Breckland towards the safety of Mildenhall. Today the heavily fortified abbey gateway on Angel Hill remains as a memorial to a troubled century.

Dr Amor was able to present us with a great deal of evidence about crime and punishment in 14th Century Suffolk. As a visiting senior fellow of The University of Suffolk and honorary research fellow of The University of East Anglia, he was well placed to do so and he had a great deal of real historical evidence to hand. However, he described a much more nuanced view of medieval law and order than can normally be gained from casual reading. His main thesis was that the fear of crime was much greater than the reality. For example, he asserted that, taking into account the very poor medical treatments available to victims in the Middle Ages, homicide rates compared very favourably with those of today. He also pointed out that most people could generally go about their business without too much fear of theft. Furthermore, law and order in Suffolk, as in much of England, was held in place by a developing network of appointed individuals, usually members of the aristocracy or gentry. They were known variously as 'Justices of The Peace', 'Jurors', 'Justices of Gaol Delivery' and, more curiously, 'Commissioners of Oyer and Terminer' (the latter being someone appointed to look at evidence connected with a felony and determine what should be done). The courts were generally kind to some of those caught in the act as they seemed to take the view that the miscreant was trying to provide for their family.

A member of the local gentry, Robert de Ashfield, held at least eight judicial appointments over an 18-year period from 1373 to 1391. He must have been a hardworking and reliable man, although he was probably not paid for his services to The Crown. He is still remembered today in Stowlangtoft, where he is buried beneath the chancel of the rebuilt church he paid for.

She has presented TV history documentaries including *Victorian Bakers* and *The Sweet Makers*, and appears on BBC Radio 4's *The Kitchen Cabinet*.

Annie Gray presents a delectable (and often humorous) trip through time, from the earliest mentions of gluttonous meals at Christmas

Edward 1 to the restoration of holiday splendour under Queen Victoria, this book is organised by festive dish, and features classic recipes alongside vibrant cultural and historical context. From the familiarity of plum pudding and mince pies to the extravagance of boar's head and brawn, the book is stuffed full of recipes, doused with history and tradition and sprinkled with the joy of the feasts of Christmas past. 
CHARITY CONCERT

Hello Elmswell,

Merry Christmas, Yule Blessings and have an enjoyable advent. You can get in the spirit with our shelves of Christmas books including the monthly display shelf.

If you still need to get you Christmas cards we have a selection available. There are a selection of charities supported through the sales including us, Suffolk Libraries, and then depending on the pack you choose includes Marie Curie, National Trust or Rainbow Trust.

Joff Ducks artwork will be up for the first part of the month. The exhibition includes prints of wildlife as well as oil paintings of landscapes and there are a couple of stocking fillers with fridge magnets and packs of postcards. 50% of any sales of anything by Joff Duck sold in the library goes to Suffolk Libraries.

From mid December the exhibition will be by artwork by Catalina Carvajal. You might have seen her colourful murals in the Stowmarket Library garden or while walking up Stowmarket high street. 

FOOTPATH WALK SUNDAY 13TH NOVEMBER 2022

On a rather dull Rememberance Sunday morning 10 walkers met as usual at the village sign and at 11.00am and paid their respects with silence and reflection.

The group set off north then east through the industrial estate to join up with Hall Lane on the old Bacon Factory housing estate then on to FP11 on the far side of the estate.

At the junction of FP11 and FP1 we turned left then right and followed FP1 north then north east past the junctions with FP2 and FP3 in the direction of Harding's Farm.

Crossing into the neighbouring parish of Norton the party continued north east along FP32, turning left onto FP31 then right on the same FP with Harding's Farm on the right.

The morning brightened into a balmy November day as the walk progressed and we turned left on to FP20 onwards towards Norton Hall turning left at the Hall on to FP7

For information purposes FP7 coming up from the Ashfield Road in Norton to Elmswell has fairly recently been diverted to the rear of the farm buildings at Norton Hall from the original route through the yard to preclude ramblers having to negotiate the risk of any potential farm yard activities.

FP7 continued south east past the barn on the right in which you might observe an owl's nest if you stick your head over the gate for a look. There is, however, no public access to the building.

The footpath zigzags across open fields with a fine view of Elmswell from the footbridge.

FP7 finally returns to the sanctuary of the parish of Elmswell at FP13 which circumnavigates the Hall and then runs parallel to the railway and on to civilisation at Hawk End Lane.

A left and left and we are back at our starting point at Crown Mill play area.

A big sky walk of approximately 4.2 miles in 1hour 46 minutes (an average speed of 2.4 miles per hour).

Autumn and winter are a busy time in the woodland! This year we decided to start using some of the forest materials we now have in abundance at Lukeswood, so we started off with a spoon carving course. This quickly grew from one morning session to three as so many people expressed an interest in taking part! We were fortunate enough to secure the help of Fay Jones, aka The Woodland Haberdasher, who is an expert in making all kinds of stuff using natural materials. Visitors to Apple Day will remember her fantastic stall, with spoons, spatulas, jewellery, buttons, naturally dyed yarns, and much more. Fay brought along some samples of the types of wood she uses for her carving - an amazing variety including some unexpected items such as ivy, rosewood and gorse. For our spoons we used some of the Lukeswood birch as it grows in abundance there and is also a good wood for novices to work with for their first spoon. Our photos show all the course participants with Fay - everyone ended up with a spoon! We're planning to run more courses with Fay next year - we're hoping to have a course making natural dyes, called 'Colours of Lukeswood' - so watch this space for news. A huge thank you to Fay for coming to Lukeswood three times when we'd only planned for one, and to all our game participants. We had a great time and learned a new skill as well.

CITIZENS ADVICE

Last year I fell for a scam when I was doing my Christmas shopping. The scam was clever. I thought I was getting a good deal but didn't realise I was being scammed until it was too late. How can I avoid the same thing happening again this year?

Scammers' tactics become more sophisticated every year, making scams tricky to recognise, but there are things you can look out for.

If it seems too good to be true, it probably is. For example, tickets to an event that are much cheaper than they're being sold elsewhere, or a holiday that's a lot less than you'd expect to pay.

Be wary of people contacting you out of the blue on social media sites or via text and email offering an item for sale or deal on something.

Do your research. If you're buying from a website you haven't used before, spend a few minutes researching it. A good place to start is finding a website's terms and conditions. You should also look up the company's address, this can normally be

found in the website's 'contact us' section and should have a street name, not just a PO box. If it's a registered UK company you can check its details on the Companies House website at gov.uk/get-informationabout-a-company

Check to see what people have said about the company. It's worth looking at different review websites to see other people's feedback – don't rely on reviews the company has put on its own website.

Scammers will often ask you to pay in an unusual way, or very quickly. For example, you're asked to send money through a transfer service like MoneyGram or Western Union or pay via vouchers.

Remember never give away your personal information like a password or PIN and never click on or download anything you don't trust.

To hear about scams in Suffolk, you can sign up to the very useful Trading Standards email at suffolk.gov.uk/community-andsafety/suffolk-trading-standards/becomea-consumer-champion

If you've transferred money, speak to your bank and the police. You should also contact the police if the scammer is in your area or you feel unsafe.

Don't feel embarrassed about reporting a scam – scammers are clever and it can happen to anyone.

Reporting a scam helps track down and stop scammers, helping to prevent it from happening to others too.



THE LAST PUBLIC OPEN SPACE IN ELMSWELL - HOW SHOULD WE USE IT?

on the last **Public Open Space** in Elmswell.

As local residents on the west of the village, we've always known that this moment was coming such is the pressure on building more and more houses on this 'quiet little A14 corridor' and lack of village coordination against the developers. However what's surprising is the speed of the announcement from Mid Suffolk District Council. Stealth like, we read about the plans in the local paper and then find out that there's a public consultation event in just over a week's time.

However, thanks to the efforts of a number of residents and the help of the wider community, we have taken action in less than a week:

- A petition asking for a halt on the plans and consideration of a new school, signed by nearly 600 residents in 3 days
- An article and photo in the Bury Free
- A question being asked at the next MSDC committee meeting on the 24th November

From the planning paper available to the public by MSDC, we know there are 3 options for the land:

1. Keep it as Public Open Space.

This land has been used for decades, by many generations of families both old and new to Elmswell. After all, what's more sustainable than open green space? With

So we finally have it ... plans for 50 houses if the shift in working behaviour and an if already increasing population, valuable land like this is needed to serve the people of the village for health and mental wellbeing benefits.

2. Build a new primary school instead of transporting extra pupils across the A14 to Woolpit.

A village the size of Elmswell should expect to have a suitable school to service the needs of the residents. There is health and wellbeing benefits of having a school within walking and cycling distance. In addition the environmental benefits of not requiring pupils to travel to school by car or bus are insurmountable.

3. Allow 50 new homes to be built.

Whilst the sustainability credentials are being pushed on this particular housing development, the question has to be asked as to why with all the other existing and further proposed developments in the village, strict sustainability criteria isn't applied at the planning application and approval stage?

As a group of local residents, we appreciate that there will be a number of different views about the land and its purpose, we also acknowledge that the eco-friendly houses are important for the environment and that some of them will provide necessary social housing. However, is the last Public Open Space in Elmswell - a space that continues to be enjoyed by numerous walkers, families and dog-walkers - the best place to put these houses? We believe not and will challenge the decision as far as we can.

WORKS ARE BEGINNING ON LAND TO THE NORTH AND WEST OF SCHOOL ROAD, ELMSWELL

Dear Residents,

As you may be aware, Bloor Homes were recently granted planning permission in August 2022 for our new development of 86 houses on School Road.

We are now commencing construction on site and as a result, we will begin works on School Road.

These works are detailed as follows:

- The main works will begin on **Monday 16th January 2023** and will last for approximately 12 weeks.
- During this period a section of School Road will be closed to traffic.
- Works include the widening of the road, construction of a 3-metre-wide cycleway, and utility diversions and connections.
- Access will remain for all residents on School Road to get in and out of their properties. However, there
 may be instances where residents must follow the diversion route and access School Road from the
 opposite end to the usual closest junction.
- There will be temporary traffic lights at the Church Road/School Road junction whilst the road widening is carried out. We expect this to begin in Mid-March, occurring between weeks 9 to 11 of the overall period.
- A pedestrian route through the closure will be maintained at all times.
- Working hours during the day will be between 8am-6pm Monday-Friday and 8am-1pm Saturday.

We will endeavour to complete the works in a timely manner. We would like to thank the local community in advance for their patience and understanding and apologise for any disruption caused.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The Parish Council meets at least once each month, excluding August, although extraordinary meetings can be called as required at any time. The November meeting with all 11 councillors present, together with BMSDC Ward Member Cllr Helen Geake, 5 members of the public and the Parish Clerk, Peter Dow. took place at Blackbourne on Monday 21st.

This report is compiled from that meeting by the Parish Clerk and edited by the Council's Editorial Board which comprises the Council Chairman, the Council Vice-chairman and Cllr Sue Roots, elected by her peers to join them. It seeks to cover some of the more interesting or significant items thought to deserve wider public attention. Included, where appropriate, are matters reported to the meeting by external bodies such as the County and District Council Ward Members or as raised at the meeting by members of the public. Further background and reference to subsequent events are included where relevant.

The Minutes of recent Parish Council meetings and Committee meetings, together with the agenda for the next meeting, when ratified, are available online at elmswell.suffolk.cloud and from the Parish Clerk by arrangement. Bound copies of older Minutes are lodged in the Village Archive at Blackbourne and with the Suffolk County Records Office in Bury St. Edmunds. The most recent Minutes from the October meeting, as approved at this meeting, are posted in the Council's notice board at Crown Mill.

Mid Suffolk District Council

Cllrs Sarah Mansel & Helen Geake tabled a written report on BMSDC activities which confirmed at last week's Cabinet meeting, members agreed the next round of CIL expenditure. CIL is the Community Infrastructure Levy which is money required from developers towards infrastructure provision to help service their developments. This included almost £1.8M of funding for expansion of Thurston Community College, part of a £2M project, with the remaining funds being sourced from West Suffolk S106 contributions. Almost £24k of the MSDC CIL funds have come from the Elmswell Ringfenced pot, with another 6 villages also contributing in this way. The remaining £567k has been sourced from the strategic pot. Meanwhile, The Councils' CIFCO investments continue to provide revenue for both councils amounting to about £1.7M for MSDC in 2021/22. The financial report and 2023 business plan were discussed by MSDC on 27th October. It was cited that the diversity within the portfolio helped weather the impact of COVID. A Winter Warmth Support Grant fund was launched on 21st October for organisations to apply for grants of £250 - £5000 to help with the increased energy, rent and food costs to enable community activities and warm spaces to remain open and available during the winter without having increase fees for residents.

Babergh and Mid Suffolk are investing £2M for 22 new HVO-fuelled waste tankers. This is the biggest upgrade to the Waste fleet in about 10 years.

The Report included a a reminder for any family living in the district who has welcomed a new baby (either by birth or adoption) this year to apply for a tree to be planted this winter. The scheme is also open to families who have lost a

child during the same period. Details of the scheme are available on the website https://www.babergh.gov.uk/ environment/planting-schemes/treefor-life/

There was a reminder that the Ward Members still have Locality Budget funds available and would welcome applications from any local club or organisation in need of funding towards the cost of a local project. **Suffolk County Council**

Ward Member Cllr Andy Mellen tabled a written report confirming that Suffolk County Council has released a survey to local residents, asking for their thoughts on the upcoming 2023/24 budget. A summary of responses will be considered when deciding how to spend your money. The Survey link is https://www.smartsurvey.co.uk/ s/7BQY0J/

The report also made mention of over 85,000 leaflets highlighting information and guidance during the cost-of-living crisis distributed amongst Suffolk communities. The leaflet shows all the help Suffolk offers with finances and household expenses, as well as how to stay warm this winter. SCC have launched their Winter Matters campaign, which aims to help ease the pressures of winter for Suffolk residents. This is a signposting campaign that centres around five key themes: Finances, Safety, Environment, Health and Wellbeing, and Highways. For more information and advice on how SCC can support you during winter, visit: www.suffolk.gov.uk/wintermatters The Cabinet recently met for the first time since the summer political recess and agreed to spend £2m on new care provision for Children and Young People in Felixstowe. In addition, SEND : Elmswell Tavern site for the proposed

services received £10m to provide more specialist units in Suffolk.

The Suffolk Local Access Forum submitted their annual report, which included their concerns about Sizewell C and its effect on green networks and Rights of Way. Concerns continue to be expressed over the effects of nuclear power on our coastal landscape and biodiversity.

In addition, the Cabinet endorsed Transport East's new 2050 strategy, which focusses more on green travel and linking rural communities to local economies. Our Group recognises the importance of connecting isolated residents for both profession and pleasure, and we will ensure SCC adopts all priorities into its own policy. This includes local bus provision which is a really difficult issue for residents affected by recent timetable reductions.

Road Safety initiative

The Clerk reported on a recent meeting with the SCC Highways Community Liaison Engineer held to confirm the basis on which the 2 bodies are collaborating towards achieving EPC's Road Safety Initiative obiectives. It was agreed that: The best locations for speed survey points to inform the proposal for a 20mph limit through the heart of the village, survey to be funded by EPC; The refreshing of white lining (ii) including the zebra crossing at The Street / New Road to be funded by SCC; The installation warning signs re road narrows / oncoming vehicles at New Road / The Street / Cooks Road junction to be specified and ordered by SCC but funded by EPC, cost to be determined.

Tavern site affordable homes

The Clerk reported on a further meeting with Orwell Housing towards an assessment of the feasibility of the

affordable homes towards a scheme which would retain local control but still attract the Government's Homes England funding. The process continues and the eventual outcome will inform Council's decision on the next step.

A14 improvement works The National Highways consultation caravan, sited at Wesley on Friday 28th October, dealt with many queries regarding the scheme to replace the concrete road surface between Tothill and the A1088 junction and seemed to be busy throughout the day. The Clerk has undertaken to work with the contractor to liaise on any problems and to keep the public informed via the Newsletter of the contraflow proposals as they develop.

The Council made a successful bid for funding from the MSDC Winter Warmth Fund Support Grant and secured £1,000.00 towards subsidising use of the coffee shop at Wesley through the issuing of gift vouchers via various appropriate village organisations and to support events designed to offer a warm and comfortable option over the winter months. The BWMA, which advises Council on use of the facilities, will liaise with village groups towards managing this appropriately.

Food Bank

With Council's agreement, arrangements are now in place to allow the Elmswell Food Bank to operate from inside the Elmswell Tavern back bar over the winter months. The Meeting agreed to fund the cost of room hire for the Christmas Gift event to be held in support of the Food Bank on 10th December Naming of development at Grove Lane Mid Suffolk consult with local communities when having to allocate names to new developments and streets such as the new cluster of housing at Grove Lane based on Hedgerows. When approached, Elmswell relies on volunteer research in the Village Archive to generate appropriate suggestions. The number of such developments in this location recently means that field names and similar references have been exhausted. However, vernacular and dialect references offer a wealth of possibilities, and the Meeting, having an eye to the hedgerow connection, accepted the suggestion of, 'Hulver' as the key name, as derived from the Old Norse 'hulfr' meaning holly i for

which is prevalent locally to the site. Reference was made to Claxton's, 'The Suffolk Dialect of the Twentieth Century', held in the Village Archive.

Parliamentary Constituency boundary changes

parliamentary review of constituencies is under way with the intention of having revisions in place by 2023 which ensure evenly-sized electorates of between 69,724 and 77,062 constituents. Parish Councillors had objected to first-pass proposals and expressed the view that, contrary to these proposals, Elmswell should have at least one significant town within the new boundary. The latest suggestion from the Boundary Commission takes account of EPC's suggestions and Elmswell is now proposed to be located at the eastern edge of a revised Bury St Edmunds constituency along with Woolpit and Stowmarket.

Tree Warden

Council has been without a Tree Warden for some time and the vacancy advertised via the District Tree Warden group. Janet Spencer has offered to fill the post. Janet, new to the village, has previously held such a post for some 15 years in Huntingdonshire and has already been helpful in recent weeks regarding tree problems presented by residents, towards the hedge planting around the new Blackbourne boundary and regarding a large job at Clay Field which was authorised at the Meeting.

School Road closure

The Clerk and Chairman have recently met with Bloor Homes to discuss the proposals for the closure of the road to allow infrastructure works, road widening and the creation of the pedestrian / cycle path. Clearly there is going to be serious disruption. It was agreed that the proposed scheme should be amended include one-way routing of HGV traffic using Cooks Road outbound offering a better right-turn sweep for exceptional trailers and reducing the chances of HGV two-way conflicts. The negotiations also confirmed that the closure is now likely to be no longer than 12 weeks rather than the 6 months originally promulgated.

Planning applications

The Meeting discussed the following 2 Planning applications forwarded for comment by MSDC, the Planning Authority:

DC/22/05091 **Erection of stables** and hay store, continued use of land for the keeping of horses and construction of new vehicular access on Land off Ashfield Road Councillors objected to this application for the following reasons;

The intensification of the use from the informal grazing and riding of horses to the establishment of stables will inevitably give rise to potential odour nuisance given that the buildings are proposed to be sited adjacent to the dwellings on the northern boundary of the proposal site.. The recent proliferation of accesses on to this busy section of Ashfield Road presents increased hazard to through traffic. This site is well served by one such recently established new access. Given the nature of the traffic generated in terms of horse boxes and large hay transporters, this existing access would present an adequate and preferable option. Further, the proposed layout does not present adequate parking or turning provision with reference, again, to the size of many of the vehicles to be expected in servicing the stables.

Councillors agreed to support this application on the understanding that Permission is conditioned by a restriction requiring that the approved buildings are to be used only for purposes incidental to and ancillary to the host dwelling, Silver Birches.
